Reflections—a word or two from our District Superintendent

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances..."

1 Thessalonians 5:16-22

During a mission trip to Kenya, I was asked to preach in the town of Migori on Sunday at the Christ Comfort Center United Methodist Church. The church met in an old storefront that was smaller than a single car garage. Its walls were losing plaster and gathering mold. There were no windows; the only light came from the front doors. Forty to fifty adults came to worship; some had to sit outside on the porch. It was in this unlikely place that I learned about gratitude.

About 15 children crowded into the worship space with us to sing for us. One voice in particular still rings in my ears. A beautiful young girl, about 10 years old, sang a solo for us. She was wearing a dress that was faded and worn. It most likely was a hand-me-down, yet it was her Sunday best. It struck me that her Sunday best was something that we would have discarded long ago. However, it was not what she wore but what she sang that has remained with me. In a beautiful clear voice she sang, "God, you're so good to me." You could see by the sparkle of her brown eyes that she was singing out of true gratitude.

On that very spot I was convicted of how much I take for granted. As was often the case in Kenya, I came to share with them, yet I came away with the greater blessing. I witnessed in a little girl's life that gratitude and joy are not contingent on income or even circumstance. Joy comes from realizing that all of life is a gift and all good gifts come from God.

A little girl in a musty church in a dusty rural town in Kenya taught me this. Perhaps, in my sharing this story, she can teach you too.

God works in many ways, using the gifts each of us has by grace. I've been asked to share ways I see God at work in the life of Christ UMC in Florence. There are two I'd like to share.

The first involves Matt Morris, who joined the staff at CUMC as Youth and Worship Minister in the spring. Matt immediately began forming deep and substantive relationships with youth and adults in the church, and his creativity has blessed the congregation in a number of ways. One unique expression of his ministry is that he offers music lessons to the youth of the church. There is

a "charge" for the lessons—15 minutes of devotional time with God, 30 minutes of learning guitar, drums, or voice. The result is that the youth have begun to take ownership of a portion of worship on Wednesday evenings as their skills are improving. The goal is for youth eventually to lead the worship on Wednesday evenings most of the time.

The second blessing of the fall has been a group of 20-25 adults who are working through C. S. Lewis's Mere Christianity on Wednesday evenings. It has been moving to see how

hungry men and women are to look deeply into our faith and be challenged by the simple truths of mere" Christianity.

The exercise is at once sobering and liberating, eliciting both conviction at our sinfulness and profound joy at the wonders of life in Christ. For several in this group, the Christian journey will never be quite the same again.

t's a joy to be in ministry with all of you in the Covington District, and I pray that the Spirit of the living God continues to work in our lives, our churches, and our common ministry.



Covington District Ministry Goals 2009-2012

- Creating new places for new people and revitalizing existing congregations.
 - Start three new faith communities (at least one African-American) in our district by 2012.
 - Increase professions of faith and worship attendance by 5% each year
 - District staff to help revitalize the ministry of our small membership churches through self-assessment and ministry goal setting.
- Developing principled Christian leaders for the church and the world.
 - Increase the number of lay and clergy leaders in our district under the age of forty by 20% by 2012.
 - Increase the practice of spiritual disciplines by our lay and clergy leaders (measured through self-report).
 - Strengthen lay and clergy leadership by providing leadership training opportunities annually.
- ♦ Engaging in ministry with the poor.
 - Emphasize two days each year in which we engage in projects across our district that help provide safe housing for the poor (e.g., remodeling, repairing, or winterizing).
 - Designate two district food drive collection days each year in which local churches collect food for their local food pantries.
- ♦ Combating the diseases of poverty by improving health globally.
 - Start three new Parish Nurse Ministries in the district by 2012.
 - Engage as a district in international partnerships that are working to improve the health of those living in East Africa (e.g., clean water in Darfur, "Nothing But Nets").

One of the largest one-day events in the tri-state, volunteers at Prepare Affair will perform winter preparation activities that mean the world to elderly homeowners with physical limitations. Services range from raking leaves and cleaning gutters to other small winter preparation tasks. Most of the service sites will be located in Boone, Kenton, and Campbell counties.

Innovation Creates Uncertainty

We don't like uncertainty. It's not comfortable.

We want innovation. We like creativity. It's engaging.

But innovation creates uncertainty. So while we say we want creativity and innovation we often reject it because it is new, different and risky. It takes us to places that we are not familiar with and places where we don't have all the answers. The irony is that while we say we like innovation we develop a deep bias against it.

Interestingly, a recent study from Cornell University states that "Anti-creativity bias is so subtle that people are unaware of it, which can interfere with their ability to recognize a creative idea." In other words, our aversion to uncertainty means we find it difficult to even recognize a creative idea when we see it, focused as we are on removing the risky, uncomfortable strain on the status quo.

Consequently, new ideas are often rejected out-of-hand in favor of the tried and trusted at times when we need new ideas the most. This resistance is so strong at times that even supporting objective evidence may not help break down barriers.

The study concludes, "Our results show that regardless of how open minded people are, when they feel motivated to reduce uncertainty either because they have an immediate goal of reducing uncertainty, or feel uncertain generally, this may bring negative associations with creativity to mind which result in lower evaluations of a creative idea."

If you want to change the world, get comfortable with the uncomfortable.

Innovation creates uncertainty. Creativity changes the status quo, but if we want to grow and develop we have to get comfortable with the unknown and accept reasonable risk. Our fear of uncertainty can cause us to reject new ideas just because they are new.
